Reproving Another Who Sins



Matthew 18: 15-20

'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Praying For One Another 2023

Lectionary Comment – Matthew 18: 15-20

Jesus has just told the parable of the lost sheep. When one sheep gets lost, he says, doesn't the shepherd "go in search of the one that went astray?" (v. 12). And, if he finds it, doesn't he rejoice "over it more than over the ninety-nine that never went astray"? (v. 13).

So, in the church, how should a "member" (v. 15) who has strayed, i.e. sinned, be treated? First, try taking him (or her) aside and "point out the fault" to him. Do not humiliate him by having others present. But if he doesn't listen, face him with his misdemeanour before a few witnesses. Sharing the reproof adds weight to it. If the person still refuses to listen, bring the matter before the whole assembly of the (local) church. If "the offender refuses to listen even to the church" (v. 17), consider the person an unworthy outsider: in Jewish parlance in Jesus' time "a Gentile and a tax collector". Expel him from the church (as Paul did at Corinth, where a man was living with his father's wife.)

Then, in v. 18, Jesus broadens what he said earlier of Peter (16:19); "you" (the whole assembly) have the authority to "bind" (here, condemn) and to "loose" (here, acquit). Their decision will be ratified by God. Finally, in vv. 19-20, Jesus tells us that in common prayer, study, and in decision-making, however small the group, if we ask God for anything seeking to know his will and do it ("in my name"), he will do it, because Jesus, God the Son, is there in the community. *Chris Haslam of the Anglican Diocese of Edmonton*

Presbytery of North East Victoria Chairperson's letter of encouragement September 2023



This month my letter offers encouragement of a different kind. I would not be so foolish as to tell Uniting Church people how to vote in the upcoming referendum, but as someone you have asked to give spiritual leadership, I am bold enough to ask you to let your faith be your guide as you consider how to vote.

I am not a football follower (I know, what can I say, a misspent life) but yesterday with others I took part in the Nagambie leg of the Long Walk led by Aussie Rules great, Michael Long. Michael is recreating his Long Walk of 20 years ago in support of the referendum. That was my personal choice, the place to which my thinking has taken me. As I walked yesterday some things occurred to me, things I wanted to share with you.

I want to ask you to stop watching fringe commentators and newscasts and even politicians that seek to inflame (if in fact you do this) and to listen to people like Michael Long, who are directly affected by the decision that will be made at the Referendum. The man I saw yesterday was impressive. A surprisingly small, quiet man, leaning on a bent stick - part trademark and part necessity I suspect - waiting patiently to speak. When he spoke there was no politicking, no fiery speeches or three-word slogans, no abuse of others, just a calm, quiet man who said he felt the need to share the load carried by Aboriginal leaders like Pat Dodson who was not well. All Michael asked of us was "Walk with me."

Next, I want to encourage you to look at what historians call the primary documents. Go to the Constitution which can be found at <u>https://www.aph.gov.au/constitution</u>

and read it for yourself noting that the referendum does not seek to alter anything in the existing document, but to add a clause to it, committing governments of all persuasions to listen to indigenous people when considering matters that relate to them. Then read the one-page Uluru Statement from the Heart and make up your own mind about what indigenous leaders are saying. I want to ask you to consider all of this in the light of the Biblical understanding of justice, justice that heals and restores relationships, and then commit all of this to prayer, seeking the leading of the Spirit, as you make up your mind about how to vote. If you are interested further in my own view, next week I will post on the Presbytery Facebook page a copy of a piece I wrote for the local paper. Let me encourage you too, to look on the Long Walk webpage https://thelongwalk.com.au for updates about where you can hear Michael for yourself. He will be in Shepparton tomorrow on September 2.

On another matter entirely I want to encourage you again to prayer for work that is being done in relation to the next steps for the Presbytery as we face a different future. A small group of people, from outside the Presbytery and within, will be meeting at Tatura on Saturday, September 16 to look at some proposals that have been put together. These will eventually come to the November Presbytery meeting at Violet Town for further thought and feedback and possibly adoption. We stand in the need of prayer. We stand in the need of the prompting of the Spirit of God on so many fronts. Let's be people of prayer as we consider important things.

The Presence of God, the peace of Christ, and sometimes uncomfortable prompting of the Spirit be with us all, Gereldine
