The Proclamation of John the Baptist

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.


As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you,

who will prepare your way;

the voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight",



John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.'

SOME THOUGHTS

There are many situations mentioned in scripture where those involved have been remembered for the lessons they have learned while spending time with Jesus.

Particularly dangerous, it seems, was to have Jesus around for a dinner party.

Simon the Pharisee did. His party was gate-crashed by the woman with the box of ointment, and before he knew it the whole disastrous event had gone down in holy writ with millions of people reading about it.

Then there was the Martha and Mary luncheon. Just as famous and almost as embarrassing. But that's the nature of the gospels. It has to do with the presence of the Christ in the ordinary things of life. However, the ordinary things become more than ordinary. taking on new depth and meaning.

Busily working to prepare the meal, Martha complained to Jesus about Mary's failure to assist in the task at hand. With this complaint Martha tumbled into religious history as the domestic busybody who got her priorities wrong. Luke recorded this incident – not to put Martha down but to record the significance of the words Jesus uttered.

'You worry and fret about so many things and yet few are needed, indeed only one.' Luke 10:41

These words are worth pondering as it is this busyness that is a feature of modern life. We are busied by a thousand things and pulled in many directions. Jesus is not calling us to abandon responsibility. Rather, he is asking us amid our busyness not to lose contact with the one thing that can give ultimate meaning to the tasks and responsibilities we have. It is not an abandonment of complexity so much as finding in complexity a deeper unity of purpose, a value which can give us peace and a sense of worthwhileness. In this case, It is not just getting the meal, but knowing and acknowledging the fact that Jesus is taking part in the meal. This gives depth and eternal significance to the Martha story.

It is the Christ who at Martha's dinner party placed before both Mary and Martha the ultimate lesson which would change the way they served. It was the Christ who challenged his friends with a choice.

The choice was whether they would live to serve God on their human journey: or avoid that type of service altogether. The same Christ faces us with the same possibility and the same decision.

Lectionary Comment - Mark 1: 1-8

Mark begins his telling of the "good news" with quotations from the Old Testament. God had promised the Israelites a "messenger" (v. 2) to lead them. The prophet Malachi understood this promise as pointing to the endtimes, to one who would prepare the way for the coming of the Messiah. To him, the "messenger" would be Elijah. While v. 3 originally spoke of return from exile, by Jesus' time it was seen as an expression of God's comfort and salvation. To us, John the Baptist comes to prepare for, and announce, Jesus' coming. Tradition says that John baptised near Jericho, in an arid region. People came to him in large numbers, repenting (changing their mind sets), "confessing their sins" (v. 5), resolving to sin no more, and dipping themselves in the River. John dressed like a hermit or prophet (v. 6). (In Palestine, some species of locusts were eaten.) John is so unworthy, compared to "the one who ... is coming" (v. 7), that he cannot untie his "sandals", a task normally performed by a slave. His baptism is a sign of purification, of turning to God, of accepting God's forgiveness and judgement; Jesus' baptism re-establishes a spiritual link between God and humans.

Gereldine's Letter of Encouragement December 23

We are in the season of Advent which is a time of both looking back and looking forward, knowing that the two are tied together to somehow help us to live at this moment.

In the next couple of weeks we will be telling the Christmas story full of peace and goodwill, full of stars and hills and snowflakes and all the while in our minds, somewhere lurking, will be what is playing out on those same hills, under those same stars, amongst descendants of those same people – something that has nothing to do with peace and goodwill.

I have three images constantly in my mind. One is of a young woman on the back of a motorbike, a captive, her face showing that she knows exactly what is going to happen to her.

The others are of children. Two little boys, brothers, covered in explosive dust. One had just pulled the other from what was left of a building. They are running backwards and forward, searching frantically for their father who is lost, screaming their fear and their anger, their grief and their terror.

In a different place, a little girl, incongruously neat and tidy, a ribbon holding back her hair - her beautiful hair. She is standing on a heap of rubble, with one hand holding on to something that I can't remember, looking across a bombed, blown to bits landscape and she is wailing, wailing.

All around me I feel a silence descending. Not the silence that accompanies peace, or the silence that falls in the face of tragedy, but the silence of turning away, the silence of not wanting to see or to know. A silence that makes jolly Christmas songs and children's pageants and a simple story of God entering our reality ring more than a little hollow.

I want to sing, I want children's pageants, I want to hear the story of the mystery of holiness creeping quietly into our reality. I want them held up as a quiet, simple, act of defiance against those who wreak havoc.

The church is not the building, it is not the organisation, it is people. We are people, who by the telling of the story of Jesus and living into that story, make it real. We are people who declare that it is by the grace of God that violence, that murder, that destruction do not have the last say, do not define us. Ours is a story that gives us hope in the face of continued evil, so my encouragement to you in this Advent and Christmas season is sing carols, stage pageants, tell the story - sing it, show it, tell it, consciously against what is happening in the world, as an act of defiance in the face of evil. It is what Jesus did, it is what we do for his dear sake, and the world turns, always it turns.

The love of God, the peace of Christ and the Spirit's gift of life renewed be yours, this and every Christmas
