SOME THOUGHTS

The desire to procure and accumulate assets is one of the fundamental impulses of the human experience. Fulfillment and satisfaction are sought by progressively increasing our ability to control and manipulate our environment.

Success comes to those who learn quickly how to stack the cards in their favour.

This acquisition of power is manifest in a variety of ways in different cultures, Individuals and groups. In his proclamation of the kingdom of God, Jesus exposed the futility and deception of seeking fulfillment in this way. 'What does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his life.'

Jesus lived in total reliance upon God, demonstrating the freedom which comes from recognising our ultimate dependence upon the one who made us in his image. To live in total abandonment to God and His kingdom is to begin to experience authentic human life – life as it is meant to be.

Privation was the lot of the disciples in every sphere of their lives. They had no security, no possessions to call their own. Not even a piece of earth to call their home. For Jesus' sake they lost everything. In following him they lost even their own selves and everything that could make them rich. In poverty of spirit, we learn to accept ourselves as someone who doesn't even belong to themselves. To surrender oneself and become poor, in biblical theology, is to be with God. To find one's hidden nature in God. To become one as Christ did is to practise poverty of spirit, to obediently accept our innate poverty as human beings.

Authentic abandonment, or poverty in spirit, realises that God is not 'out there'. God is with us, inviting us to work actively as co-creators. Totally dedicating our lives to accomplish the divine plan in that part of history entrusted to us by the span of our lives.

This invitation requests merely the giving of ourselves.

Realising our own need and powerlessness, we respond in God's power to care about other powerless brothers and sisters whom we see in need. As God has seen us in need and not left us helpless, so we are to respond in care to those we see in need.

Lectionary Comment – John 3: 14-21

Nicodemus, a Jewish leader, has come to Jesus, (because he has recognized that Jesus is "from God", v. 2), to ask: "How can anyone be born [again] after having grown old?" (v. 4) Jesus has answered: to be part of God's plan launched through him, one needs to be transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit, to be baptised into Christ (v. 5). God's Spirit works in ways that humans cannot fully understand; Jesus is the only source of knowledge about heaven: he has been there. Nicodemus fails to understand even what Jesus tells him in earthly terms, by analogy. Jesus continues with an analogy (v. 14). Moses' bronze serpent preserved from death those who (through this symbol) trusted in God. In a similar way, thanks to God's great gift of "his only Son" (v. 16, "the Son of Man", v. 14), whoever believes in Christ will have "eternal life" (v. 15), participation in God's life, life in the age to come. Jesus took on human form to save all who will listen (however sinful), not to condemn anyone, but those who willfully refuse to believe are, through the act of rejecting him, condemning themselves (v. 18). When Christ came, there are those who preferred "darkness" (v. 19), "evil": they avoided the light, the truth, lest their wickedness be exposed. But there are others who "do what is true" (v. 21): they seek out truth, i.e. God, and act accordingly as they follow his ways. Others see their example.
