The Word Became Flesh



In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the

light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, 'This was he of whom I said, "He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me." ') From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

Lectionary Comment - John 1:(1-9), 10-18

Our reading is the continuation of the book's prologue, or the whole prologue. The Word, God, Christ, has been born into this imperfect world – a world that per v. 3, "came into being through him" – but most people did not embrace him as who he is. (To know, to a Semite, involves personal commitment as well as awareness.) He came to Israel, but its people generally rejected him, but some did receive him for who he is; some became committed to him. (To know someone's name meant more than it does today.) These received the power to be adopted as sons and daughters of God: they were reborn into God's family, through the Holy Spirit ("of God", v. 13).

"Flesh", humanity, per Isaiah 40:6-8, was seen as weak, imperfect and transitory. Christ does an amazing thing: he becomes a human being (albeit, being God, a perfect one). The author is a witness to the divine presence shown in Jesus ("glory", v. 14). John the Baptizer was the first of this gospel's witnesses of the Christ-event, God become human.

From all that is in God ("fullness", v. 16), we have received gift after gift ("grace upon grace"). The Mosaic Law was given by God, and Christ brought the full revelation of God's ways. Judaism said that God could not be seen (v. 18). (Even Moses, in Exodus 33:30-44, was not permitted to see God's face.) It is through Christ, who is in complete intimacy with the Father, that we have been given access to the Father. *Chris Haslam of the Anglican Diocese of Edmonton*



World mourns loss of Archbishop Desmond Tutu

This week the world joins in mourning the passing of a towering figure in the struggle for freedom and for

human dignity and rights.



Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who has died at the age of 90, was a key leader in the moral struggle against the apartheid system in South Africa, but the impact of his life's ministry and witness extended far beyond the borders of his own country and beyond that historical moment. Also in the post-apartheid era, his principled commitment and engagement for justice for all remained unwavering. Tutu believed passionately that the Christian faith is inclusive of all, and that Christian responsibility is for the good of all people. His leadership strengthened us all in that belief and continues to call us to action upon that belief.

World Council of Churches (WCC) acting general secretary Rev. Prof. Dr Ioan Sauca said Archbishop Tutu was a stalwart contributor to the ecumenical movement during joyful times and times of great challenge, and taught us all the value of persistence. "We thank God for giving us Archbishop Tutu for 90 years," said Sauca. "Through his life and works he has become an image of dignity and freedom for all human beings and inspired many to use their gifts and talents in the service of others and the mission and prophetic task of the church."

Rev. Frank Chikane, moderator of the WCC Commission of the Churches on International Affairs, paid tribute to his counterpart in the struggle against apartheid: "In Archbishop Desmond Tutu we have lost a great prophet of God who lived among us and stood for justice – the justice of God for all – here in South Africa, on the African continent, and throughout the world, including standing against injustices committed against Palestinians in Israel-Palestine, where others would not dare to. We thank God for his prophetic witness which is worth celebrating nationally and internationally."

As well as powerful and forthright voice against injustice, Tutu was also a prophet of forgiveness. In his role as chairperson of South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission, he became, as the former head of WCC Programme to Combat Racism Baldwin Sjollema recalls, "the pastor of the nation." Tutu stressed time and again that there could be no future without forgiveness. "You can only be human in a humane society. If you live with hatred in your heart, you dehumanize not only yourself, but your community," Tutu said.

I love to be in the city when the bells of St Paul's are ringing. Such clear and joyous sounds.

Straight away you are uplifted by notes of praise, summoning you to worship.

Much practice and dedication is involved for the team of bell ringers.

A new vicar came to our little country town and he was young, keen and enthusiastic.

The church bell had been silent for a long time and, enthusiastically, he began ringing it on Sundays and Wednesdays and for special occasions.

The congregation and the town loved it, everyone except the holiday guests at

the motel next door to the church, as the loud ringing at 8am on Sundays ruined their peace and sleep-in and they made a fuss.

Finally there was a compromise. The vicar shortened the 8am ringing to a couple of notes to welcome the worshippers and allow the guests to sleep on.

Many forget the purpose of Sunday. Sport takes over, cinemas are open and the shops have sales. But the ringing bells call us to worship.

Music is special to the praise of God. Bells join with the music of Psalm 150 for worship.

Reflection:

Praise the Lord, praise him with trumpet sound; Praise him with lute and harp! Praise him with tambourine and dance, Praise him with strings and pipe! Praise him with clanging cymbals; Praise him with loud clashing cymbals! Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!
