Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10; Psalm 19; 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a; Luke 4:14-21

The Beginning of the Galilean Ministry



Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

The Rejection of Jesus at Nazareth

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

because he has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind,

to let the oppressed go free,

to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'

SOME THOUGHTS

While it is true that God is a hidden presence, we have only to let nature speak to us about the God who is everywhere. (Henri Nouwen in the Genesee Diary)

Jesus was deeply connected to the earth on which he walked. He observed the forces of nature, learned from them, taught about them and revealed that the God of creation is the same God who sent him to preach good news to the poor, sight to the blind and freedom to the prisoners. The parables Jesus taught were grounded in nature.

The natural world is not just the background to our lives. It is the living gift that teaches us about the ways and will of the creator. If we were to slow down and be more observant, we could appreciate the fact that God's presence is woven into every aspect the natural world around us. Letting nature speak opens up a new way of discerning the Divine presence. All of nature conceals great secrets that cannot be revealed if we do not listen carefully and patiently to God's hidden language. Our difficult and now urgent task is to realise that nature is not a possession to be conquered but a gift to be received with respect and gratitude. When a tree is nothing but a potential chair, it ceases to tell us much about growth. When a river is only a dumping ground for industrial waste, it can no longer speak to us about movement. When a flower is nothing more than a plastic decoration, it has little to say about the simple beauty of life.

Nature desires for us to discern the great story of God's love to which it points. The plant and animal life teach us about birth, death and growth. Rather than abuse and neglect they require gentle and appropriate care, patience and understanding.

Lectionary Comment - Luke 4:14-21

Jesus has been tempted by the devil in the wilderness (vv. 1-13) to misuse his power for his personal benefit, for worldly domination, and for protection from God's plan fulfilled on the cross. Now he returns to Galilee. Jesus customarily attends synagogue services to worship and present his message; it is there that Luke tells us who Jesus is: he stands in continuity with God's promises of old. Jesus is a great teacher; he has great authority in telling people about God and his plan. Jesus begins with one part of the scroll (Isaiah 61), then rewinds to another: vv. 18-19 emphasize his mission to those who are "poor" in any way, be it financially, in spirit, in health. In "the year of the Lord's favour", the jubilee year, debts were forgiven and slaves were set free. Jesus applies these verses to himself: he performs the works of the Messiah then expected. He then sits to interpret the readings: he says that God's plan is now being completed ("fulfilled", v. 21).

I received a treasured mail from a cousin about the "mavonnaise iar".

If you put the sand in first, there is no room for the golf balls or the pebbles. The same goes for life. If you spend all your time and energy on the small stuff vou will never have room for things that matter most.

Pay attention to the things that are critical to your happiness. Play with your children, take Fay alian alond of an ing's tract exchange upon the mass. Pray will a pour a flatent lake time to get medical check-ups and take your partner out to dinner. There will always be time to obean the house and fix the dripping tap. Take care of the golf balls first, the things that really matter. Set priorities be—cause the rest is just sand. One student asked what the coffee represented and the professor replied: "It just goes to show you that no matter how full your life may seem, there's always room for a cup of coffee with a friend."
