Mary Anoints Jesus



Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' (He said this not because he cared about the

poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

A REFLECTION

Many would suggest that the Lenten season is a time of 'giving away or laying aside.'

However, scripture tells us that it is a time of taking up.

In Mark 8: 34- 38 Jesus says to those following him that to be a true follower they are required to 'take up your cross and follow him'.

To those who heard Jesus and to those who have heard him ever since, this is truly a shocking challenge. In our present experience the cross has been sterilised. It is no longer a symbol of rejection, humiliation, suffering and death. Rather it is an ornament worn around the neck or occupying an altar. Many times, it stands proudly on the spire of a church.

At the time Jesus walked this earth the cross was a form of suffering and execution used primarily for the worst of the worst criminals, those who society totally rejected and wished dead.

As Jesus made his way to Jerusalem and ultimately to his death, he had an occasion to challenge those who heard him with the reality of what being a follower or disciple would mean.

While we are not able to speak for all those who followed him, it was only after his death, resurrection and the visitation of the Holy Spirit, that his disciples truly understood what the cross meant. Indeed, many of them experienced such a death.

But what about you and I?

For each of us, the challenge of the cross will be different and even individual. Whatever it maybe it will have one thing in common. The cross is costly. To pick up and carry our cross requires the gift of grace that only God can give. The gift we need and is available to us is costly, costly grace.

Knowing this why do we look for grace that is cheap?

There was a time when appliances, furniture and other such things were built to last.

The carpenter took great pride in his handiwork.

But things have changed, and goods are now made with a finite life expectancy.

Many want to experience an ongoing encounter with God while not being prepared to pay any price.

Yes, Jesus paid the price, and we can live in the freedom that this affords us.

However, there is still a requirement that we take up and carry our cross.
