## The Coming of the Son of Man



'There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in a cloud" with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.'

## The Lesson of the Fig Tree

Then he told them a parable: 'Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

# A REFLECTION ON CHANGE Rev Leonie Findlay

#### **PRAYER**

Lord, we are stubborn people so often refusing to let go of our familiar behaviours. Seeking comfort and security, rather than risking change.

Lord, so often following you requires us to let go of the old and familiar while embracing a new way. The way that you walk. The way of the father.

Lord, teach us your ways and direct us in new paths, we pray.

#### **SOME THOUGHTS**

CHANGE a simple 6-letter word but so unwelcome and resisted by so many.' **We've never done this before**.' Or 'The old way was so much better.'

These are often the definitive and conclusive remark about any proposed change.

When we try to make sense of such comments, we are left to decide whether they are comments made out of inertia or stem from a desire to maintain the comfort of familiarity.

The human organism and most of its organisations are resistant to change.

We seek an equilibrium – or stasis. Change takes energy, focus and a great deal of effort.

And the first barrier to even seriously needed change is that it is unfamiliar and uncomfortable,

So, our impulse for statis immediately sets up resistance. The irony is that even as we resist change, we are constantly in a state of change.

We live in a world in which the rate of change is increasing exponentially every year.

That is, there is more social, political and economic change happening faster than ever before in human history. Our resistance to change in our families and neighbourhoods, and churches is a reaction to the constant, rapid change we experience in the world around us.

Spiritually, the question becomes, 'what needed changes are we resisting?'

The comfort of familiarity can lead us to idolise what we already know and practice.

We can make an idol of what is and what has been.

Seeking God for the familiar allows the temptation to control what happens in prayer and worship. To our detriment, we can also be tempted to control our relationship with God.

In so doing, we prevent the Holy Spirit from breaking into our lives.

However, the Holy Spirit blows where it wills, and that reality means that we CANNOT control what God is doing in the world and in our lives.

We can be imprisoned by the familiar. Familiarity is comfortable, or at least it provides the illusion of comfort. The familiar can also become an icon - a substitute for grace and blessing.

If we never open our hearts and souls to the winds of the spirit- if we never risk change- then faith stagnates. To be truly open to the possibility of God's working in our lives we must risk an encounter with the unfamiliar. We must take a chance on being uncomfortable.

We must be willing to change.

## **Refugees Support via Grace**




